Bio

Ed Butts was born in Toronto, but grew up in Guelph and has always considered it his hometown. He attended the University of Waterloo, and spent eight years teaching at a school in the Dominican Republic. Ed has written more than twenty books for both adults and juvenile readers. They include Simon Girty: Wilderness Warrior, Wrong Side of the Law, The Mad, Bad and Dangerous, and Wartime: The First World War in a Canadian Town. Several of his books have been nominated for awards. Ed has contributed articles to many publications, including the Toronto Star and the Globe & Mail. He writes a monthly column about Guelph history for the Mercury-Tribune. He is also a contributor to Historica, the online Canadian Encyclopedia. Ed lives in Guelph with his daughter and grandson.

Presentation

Ed Butts on his book Guelph Stories.

Ed began his presentation by telling an anecdote about his serendipitous connection to Donald Sutherland who recently passed away. Ed's daughter had an infatuation with Donald Sutherland's son, actor Keifer Sutherland. She was nonchalant about her father's writing credits until she learned about Ed's connection to Donald Sutherland, father of Keifer. Ed had written an article for the Mercury Newspaper about the time during the Second World War when the Guelph Ontario Agricultural College was being used to train wireless operators for the Air Force. Sometime after the article was published a WWII veteran called Ed up to thank him for the article and to tell Ed that he was one of the WWII wireless operators who had trained there. That veterans name was Donald Sutherland. This connection to Donald Sutherland and Guelph, and indirectly to Keifer Sutherland, is what impressed Ed's daughter.

Ed used this anecdote to illustrate the serendipitous nature of the connections around us and this was what led him to write his book, *Guelph Stories* about the serendipitous connections to Guelph of people and events.

Ed Butts said that the stories in this recent book are not stories he has talked about in other books but are stories he has come across incidentally with connections to Guelph. He went on to give examples about some of the stories in the book.

He explained some of the sources he used for his research and how he found some interesting connections about people and events that are connected to Guelph. Following the publication of the book there were readers who contacted Ed to inform him that they were family descendants of some of the people Ed had written about. The stories bring to life the connections to the past.

The picture on the front cover of the book is a picture of the old former Guelph Carnegie Library.

Following a Q&A Doug Davidson thanked Ed and gave him a token of our appreciation.
